We are feeding it to seven cows which calve early in the spring, and are therefore naturally fast losing their milk; yet they improved considerably for three weeks after coming from hay. The milk has a slightly altered flavour from that of hay; but the butter is very good in flavour and colour, much better than hay butter.
